### **EQUIPMENT UPDATE**

## What should students bring to the College every day?

We have been reviewing the list of equipment that students need to bring with them every day. In the New Year, the following items will be required on a daily basis for students in Years 7 to 11.

Please can you ensure each of your children has the items listed opposite in bold for their return on Wednesday 8 January.

All students in receipt of Free School Meals will be given a free set of equipment, if needed.

It is really important every child has what they need for each lesson. The disruption and loss of lesson time caused when students are missing items can be significant. From Monday 13 January, tutors will be completing a weekly equipment check. If students are missing an item, this will be logged on Class Charts (please note: no behaviour point will be assigned) and the student will be expected to replace it as soon as possible. However, if a student repeatedly has missing items, we will issue a lunchtime detention.

As a back-up, each classroom will have a set of pens and pencils so that if a student forgets or

loses theirs, they will be able to borrow one so they can complete their written work with minimum disruption. In addition, we have decided to make equipment easily available so items will be able to be purchased from the library at North Site.





### **ABSENCE - Important Notices for Parents and Carers**

If your child is absent from College, please can you call the College every day of their absence before 8.30am. Please leave a message with specific detail as to why they are unable to attend. Please can we also ask you to let us know of any medical/orthodontist appointments in advance. This helps unnecessary phone calls being made.

### **UNAUTHORISED ABSENCE FROM COLLEGE**

If your child is absent from school without authorisation, you will be committing an offence under the Education Act 1996. We may submit a request to Cornwall Council for a Penalty Notice to be issued, in accordance with Sections 444A and 444B of the said Act. Penalty Notices are issued per liable parent, per child and each carry a fine of £80 if paid within 21 days or £160 if paid after this but within 28 days.

If your child is further absent from school without authorisation within any 3-year period, you will be committing a further offence under the Education Act 1996. We may submit a request to Cornwall Council for a Penalty Notice to be issued, in accordance with Sections 444A and 444B of the said Act. Penalty Notices for a second offence are issued per liable parent, per child and each carry a fine of £160, payable within 28 days. Importantly, fines per parent will be capped to two fines within any three-year period. Once this limit has been reached, other action such as a parenting order or prosecution will be considered.

Failure to pay the Penalty Notice may also result in legal action. If you are prosecuted and attend Court because your child has not been attending school, you could get a fine of up to £2,500. Cornwall Council may also apply for the costs incurred in taking the matter to Court, including legal costs.

Absence not authorised by the school may also result in a prosecution in the Magistrates' Court under Section 444(1) or Section 444(1A) of the Education Act 1996, leading to a fine of up to £2,500 and/or a custodial sentence. Again, Cornwall Council may also apply for the costs incurred in taking the matter to Court, including legal costs.

Money raised from fines is only used by the local authority to cover the costs of administering the system, and to fund attendance support. Any extra money is returned to the Government.

'Parent' as set out in Section 576 of the Education Act 1996, defines parent to include: natural parents, whether they are married or not; any person or body who has parental responsibility for a child (as defined by the Children Act 1989) and; any person who, although not a natural parent, has care of a child. Having care of a child means a person with whom a child lives and who looks after a child, irrespective of what their relationship is with said child.

The Department for Education does not allow Headteachers to grant any leave of absence for children during term time unless there are exceptional circumstances. If you consider that your request for absence is exceptional, please complete the form on the College website.

A response from the school will be sent to you as soon as possible. If leave is not authorised and you nevertheless withdraw your child from school, the absence will be recorded as unauthorised absence.

## Baby Egg and Flour Baby Project 2024




The Year 10 Baby Egg and Year 12 Flour Baby Projects aim to teach students about responsibility and empathy by assigning them a "baby" to care for. Each student is required to treat their 'baby' as if it were a real infant, ensuring its "safety" and "well-being" throughout the week-long project.

Through the Baby Egg Project, students develop a sense of empathy, which can help them appreciate parental responsibilities. They also learn the importance of constant vigilance and planning, understanding how easily accidents can happen! The project encourages students to think critically about the challenges and responsibilities of parenting, preparing them to understand the demands and skills needed for parenting in a fun yet meaningful way. Many of the 'Baby 'eggs' went on quite an adventure, attending lessons and various other activities in the community.


For Year 12, The Flour Baby Project is a hands-on educational activity designed to give students an understanding of parenting responsibilities, but it takes the concept a step further by using a small bag of flour to represent a baby instead of an egg. Some of the babies looked quite realistic from a distance and caused them to attract quite a bit of attention in the community! Through this project, students learn about the demands of

parenthood and gain insights into attachment. As students carry and care for their flour baby, they are encouraged to treat it as a real child. They are prompted to talk to it, soothe it, and carry it closely—similar to how a parent might interact with an infant. This process allows students to experience the emotional connection that develops with caregiving.

The Flour Baby Project provides students with insights into attachment theory, particularly the role of consistent care, physical proximity, and emotional connection in fostering attachment. Students saw how the consistent care and effort of parenting fosters emotional bonds and helped them to understand the significance of attachment in child development. By simulating the caregiving experience, students gain a realistic perspective on the challenges and rewards that come with caring for a dependent. The Flour Baby Project is a valuable tool for teaching both practical and emotional lessons about caregiving, attachment, and responsibility. During their time as 'parents' Year 12 sought 'childcare' from the science technicians and were shocked when their babies were returned with a childcare bill and dirty nappies! The whole school community has supported both the projects fully and it has been great to see the innovative and mature way in which the students have risen to their parenting challenges.





















### Cornwall's Keenest Scientist?

## Royal Navy Attract and Recruit Team

On Tuesday 19 November Post 16 had a visit from the Royal Navy Attract and Recruit team. Karen, Dan and Kahn arrived with bags full of equipment ready to lead 2 workshops where they put a group of eager Post 16 students through their paces. During the first session the students were set a task to build a structure to aid people in a humanitarian crisis, the students worked in small teams and had limited time to build their structure they then had to present to the other teams explaining the purpose of their structure and the difficulties they overcame during the process.

During the second session the students took part in various activities highlighting how to work as a team and build leadership skills. One of the activities saw the students timed whilst holding hands in a circle with their eyes closed and they had to feed themselves through a hula hoop to give them an idea of the challenges faced during an escape from a submarine.

The workshops were both very much enjoyed by the students including Alfie P Year 12 who said 'it was an eye opening insight into the varying types of work the Navy do'.





Former Student Wins Prestigious Gibbs Prize for MPhys Project

We are delighted to announce that Thomas Fogg, a recent graduate of the University of Oxford was awarded the Gibbs Prize for the best MPhys project this year.

Thomas' research, supervised by Manjit Dosanjh in collaboration with Cameron Robertson from Oxford, Andrea Latina from CERN and Alexander Gerbershagen from the Particle Therapy Research Centre (PARTREC) at the University of Groningen, focused on the effects of the first quadrupole magnet in a novel, toroidally symmetric particle therapy delivery system known as GaToroid.

His work involved using a multipolar expansion to identify impurities in the quadrupole magnet and comparing the particle distributions tracked through this design with those of a regular quadrupole.

Despite the presence of certain impurities, the novel design was found to replicate the desired results excellently, marking a significant step forward in the development of the GaToroid system. This system has the potential to revolutionize particle therapy by offering cost-effective and space-efficient treatment options compatible with ultra-high dose rates.


Thomas's dedication and innovative approach have not only earned him this prestigious award but have also paved the way for further research in the field. He will continue his academic journey later this year, starting a PhD at PARTREC, where he will investigate ultra-fast irradiation mechanisms for particle therapy.


All of them confidently spoke out about the needs for Youth Provision in our community representing all of the children in the Kerrier area not just service children. They all had prepared their own things to say and were all so

### 2. Encouraging School Attendance
