This month, post-16 chemistry students had the opportunity to get handson with the Spectroscopy in a suitcase kindly lent to the college by Plymouth University.

The students used the Infra-red (IR) spectrometer and their analytical skills to determine the function groups present in a range of organic molecules. IR spectroscopy is not only used by students for structure determination, but is widely used by research chemists and also by police forces for forensic testing and in breathalysers!





MFL FOOTBALL WEBINAR

On Tuesday 26th March, the MFL department organised a webinar for some keen footballers in Year 8 and two Year 7 classes to inform them about the importance of language learning. This motivational talk explored the pivotal role languages play in various career paths within the football industry, from player recruitment to international negotiations. It featured insights from industry experts, anecdotes from players and managers, and practical advice for students interested in pursuing careers in football. The webinar was led by Futbol Lingo (a language-learning app specific to football), Academy Manager, Mark Muddyman, and former MFL teacher turned coach, Pierce Kiembi.



The students were really impressed with the number of different languages spoken by many professional football players and their managers. The record is held by one of the female players who can speak a total of 12 languages! The message was very in football, clear: very often, "the more

languages you learn, the more you earn". The webinar hosts also stressed the importance of speaking to be understood, rather than to speak perfectly. In response to the question that we often hear from students "Why do I have to learn a language when everybody speaks English?", the hosts insisted that "the best way to build a relationship with someone is to speak their language".

The MFL department hopes that students gained a valuable insight the range of careers available within the football industry and that they will be inspired to continue their language learning journey further.


LIFESAVING AWARDS





Since the NCCE's establishment in 2018, it has engaged with 60,000 teachers from more than 20,000 schools in England, created the Teach Computing Curriculum which has seen over one million downloads of lessons, engaged over 1,600 schools with the Computing Quality Framework and supported 54% of students

studying AS and A level computer science through the Isaac Computer Science platform.

Term-Time Holidays

The Department for Education does not allow Headteachers to grant any leave of absence for children during term time unless there are exceptional circumstances. Please complete the form available on the College website if you believe your circumstances are exceptional. If leave is not authorised and you nevertheless withdraw your child from College, the absence will be recorded as unauthorised absence.

At Helston Community College we consider 'Good' attendance to be 97% and above. A student with between 93% and 97% is considered to be a regular attender. The Government classifies less than 90% as 'persistently absent'.

If your child is absent from College without authorisation, you will be committing an offence under the Education Act 1996. We may submit a request to Cornwall Council for a Penalty Notice to be issued, in accordance with Sections 444A and 444B of the said Act.

Penalty Notices are issued per liable parent, per child and each carry a fine of £60 if paid within 21 days or £120 if paid after this but within 28 days. Failure to pay the Penalty Notice may result in legal action. Absence not authorised by the school may result in a prosecution in the Magistrates' Court under Section 444(1) or Section 444(1A) of the Education Act 1996, leading to a fine of up to £2,500 and/or a custodial sentence. Cornwall Council may also apply for the costs incurred in taking the matter to Court. If found guilty, the parent(s) will receive a criminal conviction.

ABSENCE – Important Notices for Parents and Carers

If your child is absent from College, please can you call the College every day of their absence before 8.30am. Please leave a message with specific detail as to why they are unable to attend. Please can we also ask you to let us know of any medical/orthodontist appointments in advance. This helps unnecessary phone calls being made.

Preparations for the Summer Ball is in full flow. I cannot wait to see the students in their beautiful gowns and


