



All students were fantastic; we had a few fishmongers in the making and all students have learnt some really valuable life skills, which will also aid their GCSE practical exams. ABSENCE – Important Notices for Parents and Carers

If your child is absent from College, please can you call the College every day of their absence before 9.15am. Please leave a message with specific detail as to why they are unable to attend. Please can we also ask you to let us know of any medical/orthodontist appointments in advance. This helps unnecessary phone calls being made.

Please note: If your child is absent from College without authorisation, you will be committing an offence under the Education Act 1996. We may submit a request to Cornwall Council for a Penalty Notice to be issued, in accordance with Sections 444A and 444B of the said Act. Penalty Notices are issued per liable parent/carer, per child and each carry a fine of £60 if paid within 21 days or £120 if paid after this but within 28 days. Failure to pay the Penalty Notice may result in legal action. Absence not authorised by the College may result in a prosecution in the Magistrates' Court under Section 444(1) or Section 444(1A) of the Education Act 1996, leading to a fine of up to £2,500 and/or a custodial sentence. Cornwall Council may also apply for the costs incurred in taking the matter to Court.

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Helston Community College hosted an IET Faraday Challenge Day in April, delivered in partnership with UK Research & Innovation.

Teams from Cape Cornwall and St lves Schools joined us for the day to compete in the national STEM engineering challenge with a team of Year 8 engineers.

The context of the challenge deals with how in the future travel and transport will use airspace as much as ground space. People-operated electric aircraft will share the airways with self-drive aircraft and drones.

Vertical, high-rise architecture might allow entry and exit on many levels and students were asked to think creatively about our global need to adapt the way we live to accommodate these exciting developments.

Teams raced to design and build a prototype that could be developed by the Future Flight Challenge Team under one of the following themes:

- Accessibility and ease of use
- Safety
- Impact on the environment

presentation of ideas needed to demonstrate consideration of innovation, resources and budget, problem solving and resilience and time keeping.

The hosts made it a very close competition in terms of teamwork, time organisation and engineered prototype, but ultimately the winners won thanks to detailed paperwork!

Congratulations to Elsie, Joseph, Lewis, Holly, Skye and Gabriel for scoring 82 points – such a shame to miss out on the national final.

Another Turner Prize winning artist visits Helston...

On Thursday 4 May, a mixture of Post 16 - BTEC Level three Diploma, A Level Fine Art and Photography students enjoyed a talk by yet another Turner Prize winning artist! Mark Wallinger gave an insightful talk; explaining his journey into the arts, discussing his varied influences, which include literature, political and historical sources. Mark also showed stills and film clips of his work, including: Stately home (1985), Ghost (2001) and Sleeper (2004). The talk allowed the students to access the deeper meanings behind Mark's work and have an opportunity to pose questions to the artist.

BEATING THE BOUNDARIES

The ancient ceremony of 'Beating the Boundaries' originated in 1585 and involves walking the route of the boundary stones and blessing them, by tipping walkers upside-down and tapping their heads on the stones. Children in attendance are then invited to tap the stones with nearby branches and give the stones three cheers. This year Mr Semmons and Mr Ellis kindly volunteered to walk the route with 10 Key Stage 3 students, and even took part in the ceremony themselves! The students proudly represented the College and their behaviour was exemplary. At the end of the route, walkers were treated to refreshments at Penventon Farm, which were very much welcomed after a long trail.









Tom Stockley

On Tuesday the multi-disciplinary artist Tom Stockley spoke to the KS3/4 LGBT+ lunchtime group. Tom talked about how hard it was growing up as an LGBT+ person in the South West because of being bullied and discriminated against both in and out of school due to his sexuality. Tom also gave incredibly useful advice to the students, such as, "Your identity is not a race, or an end point - you have your whole life to figure out what spectrums you exist on, and what words work best to describe you". He also urged them to "form communities and support each other! Find spaces where you can be yourself and be loved for it - you are all complex and beautiful and deserve to be seen for who you are". Tom was both an informative and engaging speaker, and the students very much enjoyed the talk and Q and A session afterwards where they asked for Tom's advice on 'coming out' safely to their parents and peers. 'Coming out' is a term given to LGBT+ people's self-disclosure of their sexual or gender orientation.

Tom also led a workshop with Year 10 and 12 students at the Exchange Gallery in Penzance on Wednesday 24 May on performance art and DIY film making. The students will be responding to the https://newlynartgallery.co.uk/activities/we-are-floating-in-space/group exhibition of artists who have made work in Cornwall and Devon, using ideas of the coast or the materials of the shoreline as their inspiration. The exhibition is on until June 3rd.

Mr Lingard's Jurassic Coast Challenge

Two weeks ago, Mr Lingard took on the Jurassic Coast Challenge - a 100km run along the beautiful coastline of Dorset. With hard climbs up some very steep cliff paths plus the difficult terrain of Chesil Beach, Mr Lingard needed all his resilience to make it to the end. Nearly 750 participants started the race, but only 550 finished. Mr Lingard set off at 9am and didn't get to the finish line until 1am, 5 hours after the winner. He did though come 57th and managed to raise over £1300 to aid those who continue to suffer as a result of the earthquake disaster in Turkey and Syria. He's now looking for his next challenge in 2024!

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


